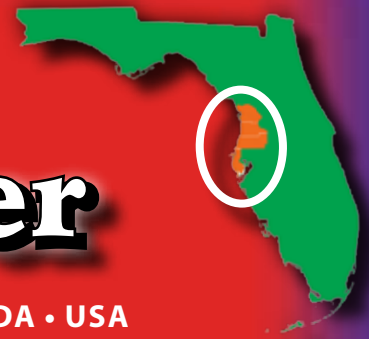

Thoughts on Membership

Almost all of you have heard me talk about increasing membership. Our Rotary clubs must deliver value that satisfies our membership and give Rotarians the opportunity to make a greater impact.

An easy way to become involved in Rotary

I believe everyone is aware of the significance of Membership. The most important obligation a person accepts when joining a Rotary club is to share Rotary. The policies of Rotary International clearly affirm that Membership Development is RI's highest priority and every individual Rotarian has an "obligation to share Rotary". Everyone must know at least one person who should belong to Rotary.

This brief statement, 106 words in its current form, is a key element of the Rotary International Constitution. The "ideal of service" is the key phrase, expressing an attitude of thoughtfulness and helpfulness in one's endeavors.

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service.

Rotary was founded upon networking and fellowship. Rotarians have the opportunity to create enduring relationships and personal connections with

many business, professional, and community leaders.

SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society.

Our members are leaders in their fields and communities. Being a Rotarian validates the person and their profession and Rotary helps to make one a better person.

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life.

Rotarians foster the ideal of service which is the foundation of building and sustaining relationships. Rotary gives you the opportunity to build relationships, but more important, it gives you the opportunity to contribute to society

FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Rotary unites people from all cultures and occupations. Every Rotarian wears a pin that says "Rotary International." There are few places on the globe that do not have a Rotary club.

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District 6950 Rotarian earns President's Volunteer Service Award

District 6950 Rotarian earns President's Volunteer Service Award

SARASOTA, Fla., April 15, 2015 – As National Volunteer Week, April 12-18, is being observed, Michael Mira, a member of the Rotary Club of Zephyrhills of Rotary District 6950, has been recognized by President Obama and humanitarian organization, ShelterBox USA with the President's Volunteer Service Award for his efforts in 2014 to assist disaster survivors.

When disasters like Cyclone Pam in the Vanuatu and the Syrian refugee crisis strike, many want to help. Mira took action for ShelterBox, an international disaster relief organization that delivers emergency tented shelter and other life-saving supplies to survivors of disasters and other humanitarian crises.

Through Michael's efforts of raising awareness and funds for ShelterBox, the organization was able to respond to more than 23 disasters last year, providing families with disaster relief tents, cook stoves, water filters, blankets, mosquito nets, children's packs and other essential equipment. In one of the more busy years in ShelterBox history, ShelterBox has sent aid to support more than 10,500 families.

"I am incredibly honored to work alongside our volunteers, including Michael," said Alan Monroe, Interim Executive Director of ShelterBox USA. "It is through their continuous efforts that we are able to bring shelter, warmth and dignity to so many families displaced by disaster around the globe."

The President's Volunteer Service Award is a special recognition presented on behalf of President Barack Obama. The award is part of a national recognition program created in 2003 through the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation for individuals of all ages who contribute a significant amount of time to volunteer activities.

National Volunteer Week was established in 1974 and has grown exponentially each year, with thousands of volunteer projects and special events scheduled throughout the week. This year marks the 41th anniversary of Na-

tional Volunteer Week, demonstrating the enduring importance of recognizing our country's volunteers for their vital contributions.

Tents and adaptable shelter kits arrive in Nepal

ShelterBox's logistics team, along with help from our response teams in Nepal, have worked around the clock to transport aid into Nepal. Despite major logistical challenges and a bottleneck at Nepal's only international airport in Kathmandu, an initial 500 tents, along with 500 shelter kits have now arrived in the country to bring shelter to the thousands of communities torn apart by the massive earthquake.

While early reports suggest that around 600,000 homes have been damaged or destroyed, the full extent of the 7.8 magnitude quake that hit between the major cities of Pokhara and the capital of Kathmandu is yet to be revealed.

Our ShelterBox response teams are currently based in Kathmandu as well as in the district of Sindhupalchowk, where around 95% of buildings have been damaged or totally destroyed by the shock of the earthquake.

In Kathmandu and other urban areas, the main priority is to clear rubble, and to rebuild structures, while in rural and remote areas, whole villages have been totally devastated.

Nicola Hinds, who arrived in Nepal last week, said: 'We have already heard that in the area of Gorkha, 90% of buildings have been destroyed and a further 5% have been partially destroyed. We believe that it will be a real challenge to reach all of these communities, but

we will find a way because that's what ShelterBox does.'

As different types of aid are needed in different parts of the country, ShelterBox's logistics team, based in Helston, UK, have decided to send 500 UN specification tents and 500 shelter kits from pre-positioned stocks in Dubai.

Families in remote areas, who have completely lost their homes, will be provided with tents, while shelter kits will be distributed to people living in urban areas.

The kits, which contain tarpaulins, rope and essential tools for building, can be used to help clear rubble, to make temporary shelters and to repair damaged homes.

Shane Revill, Supply Chain Manager, said: "By sending out a range of different aid, we are ensuring that we meet the needs of different communities. In rural areas, whole villages have been destroyed, so it is essential that families have shelter to protect them from the elements. In cities like Kathmandu, the contents of our shelter kits will help people to re-

build their homes while be able to stay close to their families and communities.'

Since the earthquake struck, our ShelterBox response team members have already distributed tents, which were prepositioned in the country, to hospitals in Nepal that had been badly damaged by the quake. They have also been working with other aid organizations to help deliver essential food and shelter to remote communities in Nepal's mountains.

ShelterBox will continue to send further aid to Nepal and is currently finalising partnerships with fellow aid agencies Handicap International (HI), the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and the Agency for Technical Co-operation and Development, (ACTED), to ensure that we reach as many communities in need of shelter as possible.



Dear Rotary Members,

Many of you have contacted the district asking for information on how we can help the people that were devastated by last weeks earthquake in Nepal.

Well here we have a great opportunity:

As you know, a 7.8 earthquake and subsequent aftershocks have ravaged Nepal over the past week. You may also know that I am a volunteer for an organization called ShelterBox. ShelterBox is a 501(c)3 charity that specializes in providing emergency shelter and other life-saving supplies such as stoves, tool kits, water purification and other essential items following disasters such as the Nepal earthquake.

ShelterBox response teams arrived on the ground within days and reported back massive damage with people living in the streets and in desperate need. I'm reaching out to let you know that a generous donor has offered to match the first \$100,000 in donations marked for the matching gift campaign to ShelterBox USA during the month of May.

ShelterBox can only be ready to respond instantly to a disaster such as the earthquake in Nepal because they have received support months in advance to procure and preposition its aid. The support received from this campaign will help ShelterBox refill stock levels that are being depleted due to the Nepal response plus the eight other ongoing deployments. Unfortunately, ShelterBox must deploy to a new disaster every two weeks and replenishing inventory is a priority in order to reach vulnerable families.

Instagram Will Become Essential For Image-based Social Media Marketing

Instagram isn't showing any signs of slowing down by a long shot. With 300+ million monthly users and 30 billion photos shared, it has become "the network" when it comes to image-based social media marketing. There are 2.5 million 'likes' on images each day and 70 million uploaded daily (yes, you read that right). Research confirms this, although perhaps not to the same extent:

According to the Social Media Marketing Industry report, 42% of marketers are planning to increase their use of the platform this year, compared to 38% in 2013.



Instagram

Instagram will also continue to grow in the micro-video space. With both Vine and Instagram vying for billing as the top video networking site, the platforms have continued to differentiate themselves from the other offering different features, video lengths and editing capabilities. However, I believe we'll see Instagram begin to outpace Vine as we enter 2015.

And with the recent emergence of Instagram's in-feed video advertising, marketers will now have the option of paying to target their 15-second videos to users based on age, gender and country. 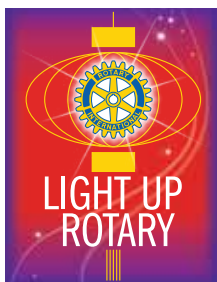

Red Cross Comfort Kits Project

April 08, 2015

The Rotary Club of Oldsmar/Eastlake has budgeted \$750.00 and plans to raise another \$500.00 from the local community to support the "Red Cross Comfort Kits Project". The Red Cross Comfort Kits Project involves collecting, assembling and donating 3000 or more comfort kits to the American Red Cross, depending on how many Rotary Clubs will participate. It can be a "District Grant" project, or it can be a much larger "Global Grant"

project if clubs in Puerto Rico or in the Bahamas get involved. To start, we need a minimum of four clubs to participate with a budget of \$1250.00 per club. Then, as a "District Grant" project and if approved, Rotary district 6950 will match with \$2500.00. If it becomes a Global Grant project, matching funds will be much more from the district as well as Rotary International.

The adult comfort kit includes a toothbrush, hairbrush, washcloth, travel-size bar of soap, toothpaste, lotion, deodorant, razor, shaving lotion, shampoo and feminine hygiene product (female kits). Children receive a kit that contains a child-size toothbrush, toothpaste, hairbrush, bar of soap, washcloth, coloring book, crayons and a small toy. The current estimated cost is \$2.00 per kit. Negotiations are under way with Dollar Tree Corp. to buy these items at cost. If this goes through, cost per kit can be around \$1.00.

Comfort kits are an essential part of

any Red Cross disaster response. From larger scale international or national natural disasters such as earthquakes, hurricanes or tsunamis to the smaller local disasters such as house fires, floods or storms, to which the Red Cross responds on a daily basis in the U.S., comfort

kits help those who have lost everything and have nothing, not even a toothbrush.

The current plan is to involve Rotarians from different Rotary Clubs, Interact Clubs, and volunteers from various organizations in the assembly and distributing process of these comfort kits. This project is a "Win-Win" situation for everyone involved. It is an excellent opportunity for Rotary Clubs and Rotarians to team up and interact with each other while working to support a very good cause. It is an excellent opportunity for high school kids from Interact, S4TL, and Rotarac to earn their much needed community service hours in order to qualify for scholarships. It is an excellent opportunity for the various organizations and schools that we assist annually to show their support and to give back, and an opportunity for community volunteers to get involved. Last but not least,

it will create an opportunity for local businesses to get involved and/or to donate.

This project not only will help provide the American

Red Cross what has always been in short supply, but it will help provide the vic-

tims with what they desperately need at a time when they have lost everything. Through our news releases and our social media efforts, we can generate lots of good publicity for local Rotary Clubs and, at the same time, create lots of Rotary awareness.

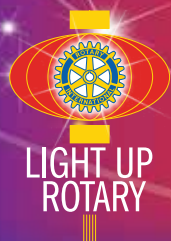
