## Rotary 6950 Facebook Pages:

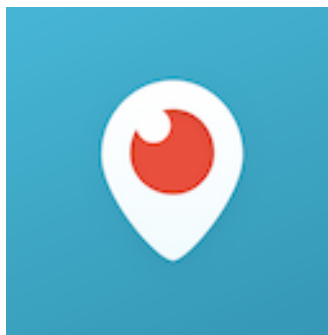

In March 2015, Twitter purchased Periscope for \$100 Million Dollars. It was officially relaunched on March 26th and has become (now) one of the fastest growing segments of social media EVER!

The app became so well known as the news broke when the recent Mayweather vs Pacquiao fight was seen for free by an estimated 500k

people who never paid the \$90 to view it on Premium Channels. This was done through Periscope.

The services of Periscope are available in the mobile application itself as well as on Twitter. Users of Periscope are able to choose whether or not to make their video public or simply viewable to certain users such as their friends or families. Periscope allows viewers to send "hearts" to the broadcaster by tapping on the mobile screen as a form of appreciation. Now available for use on IOS (iPhone) or Android mobile devices, this app will allow anyone, any club, any person with a phone to for FREE broadcast an immediate LIVE feed of whatever and wherever they are. ## Rotary club meets on a train

On the Deccan Queen Express, an Indian passenger train that connects Mumbai with Pune, members of the Rotary Club of Pune Deccan Queen conduct their weekly meeting. It may very well be the only Rotary club in the world that meets on a train.

The Deccan Queen is one of the most popular trains in the sector and a daily means of transportation for thousands commuting between the two cities. The idea was first proposed in 2012, but since the route crosses through two Rotary districts, it took a while to reach agreement the club would be considered to meet in District 3131 (which includes Pune).

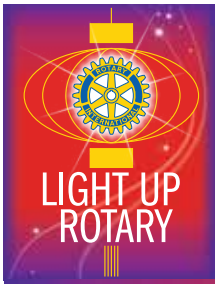
Every Thursday, members get together in a special car for pass holders. There are 25 members at the moment, and prominent citizens traveling on the train are invited as speakers. We have conducted community service projects including health checkup camps for train porters and railway staff, and made infrastructure improvements to the station in Pune. We are planning to begin monthly fellowship meetings in the city so members can bring their family and they, too, can experience the joy of Rotary.

## Florida Blue Sapphire Award

Margarita Romo----Reverend, Pastor of Resurrection House Mission, Founder and Executive Director of Farmworkers Self Help, Hispanic Woman of the Year, Florida Civil Rights Hall of Fame Inductee, Rotarian, and Paul Harris Fellow. We are proud to announce two more well-deserved accolades. Saint Leo University recently bestowed a Doctor of Humane Letters degree on Margarita, and the Florida Blue Foundation honored her with their 2015 Sapphire Award and \$50,000!

An assertive but humble native of Texas, Margarita explained her life's work this way in a 2011 Tampa Bay Times article: "This is what God planned for me, and I will be here until the day I die." Margarita not only "talks the talk," she "walks the walk" every day. A resident of the migrant Mexican-American community known as Tommytown on the outskirts of Dade City, she shares her home with two grandsons and two young men who are proud graduates of Saint Leo University, thanks to the extraordinary fundraising ability of Margarita. Jose Amateco, a 2014 graduate, works as a tutor at the university earning money to enter graduate school with the goal of eventually becoming a physician. Carlos Segovia, a June graduate, has set his sights on law school.

Growing up in poverty in Texas, Margarita was quick to recognize the plight of the immigrants working in the orange groves in Central Florida when she moved here in the 1970s. Her solution was to found Farmworkers Self Help (FSH), a bootstrap nonprofit organization which assists migrant and formerly

migrant workers in East Pasco County. Among the services offered by Farmworkers Self Help are immigration assistance, a free clinic, job training, a thrift store, English classes, housing, food distribution, holiday meals and celebrations. Margarita summed up the reason for the title of the organization in a 2013 interview printed in The Laker-Lutz News: "We need to think for ourselves. If we're really about teaching people to be free, then you've got to give them the tools to do that . . . To help us learn to think for ourselves is where the real work comes in and the real love."

Margarita's special love and hope for the future is the children, and hundreds of "her children," ranging in age from 2 to 32, call her "Abuela" or "Grandma." Farmworkers Self Help provides a safe place for teens and children to gather after school and on weekends for homework, snacks, arts & crafts, dance classes, soccer, and just plain fun. They soon learn, though, that with privilege comes responsibility. Boys and girls from grade school through

college age often accompany Margarita to the state capital in Tallahassee to lobby legislators for instate tuition, health care for legal migrant children, better working conditions and pay for farmworkers. She doesn't hesitate to take them with her as she approaches state senators, house members, and even the governor and asks them to pray with her.

Margarita's history with Rotary began when David West, a member of the Dade City Rotary Club, proposed her as a Paul Harris Fellow. Several years later, after speaking to members of the

Rotary Club of San Antonio, Margarita was invited to join the San Antonio club. She so inspired members of the small club that they soon adopted Farmworkers Self Help as their signature project. This Rotary Club has received several district grants for their FSH projects, which included helping to refurbish a pool hall into a youth center called Mi Otra Casa (My Other House). Five students from the community have attended Saint Leo University, due in part to scholarship assistance from the club. For the younger students, the club hosts a Back-to-School party and distributes backpacks with school supplies every August. A mentoring program for girls is in its fourth year, with club members meeting weekly with girls ranging in age from 5 to 13. The girls meet professional women and learn about different professions, receive help with homework, learn cooking, sewing and self-defense, and enjoy arts & crafts. Their education continues over the summer months with a Reading Rainbow program. Their favorite activity is their dance group, Las Mariposas (the Butterflies). Not only do they learn traditional Mexican dances, they perform at churches, schools, and community events. At times, you might even see Margarita join in.

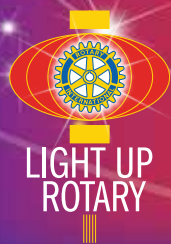
The relationship between the club and FSH is not a one-way street, however. Members of the FSH community have worked with the club at Relay for Life and other community events. Women have made dresses, scarves, and hats for the club to distribute in other countries. The club has held installation dinners in the youth center and members participate in Cinco de Mayo and other celebrations in the community. In the words of Betty Burke, Past President of the club and organizer of the mentoring program, "Farmworkers Self Help is not our charity. . . it is our partner."
